Growing up in a family unit con-

sisting of one father, seven mothers and 32 children in the Bedford Stuyvesant ghetto, she realized that the goal of most neighbors was simply to make it to the next paycheck. She says she kept herself "from this oppressing mentality and built a shield of motivation" based upon self-discipline and her own imagination.

In an interview on Channel 13 during her high school days, she discussed her experiences as a young Muslim woman in American society. She went on to get her high school diploma by passing an equivalency test and she won an Empire State Scholarship to the State University of New York, Purchase, where she majored in photography and received her bachelor of fine arts degree this year. She was also a Fullbright scholarship finalist in 1996.

She has worked as photo editor of Muslim Woman Magazine, a production assistant in filming, editing and researching documentaries for Channel 13, and a photo assistant at Source Magazine in New York.
